

In memory of their daughter, Jillian Blair, a young and vibrant artist with a unique vision, Amy and Michael Blair have established the Jillian Blair Visual Arts Memorial Scholarship at the DMACC Foundation. The scholarship represents more than just financial support; it memorializes Jillian's legacy of creativity and quirkiness, and celebrates unique artistic minds.

Jillian was the youngest of Amy and Michael's three daughters. From a young age, it was evident that she had a special connection to the world of art. Jillian was a visual learner and possessed a natural talent for creating meaningful and captivating visual art. Whether it was fashion design, interior design, graphic design, or photography, she had an innate ability to translate her thoughts, emotions, and perspectives into compelling art forms.

A junior at Johnston High School, Jillian tragically passed unexpectedly in April 2022, within a month of being diagnosed with a rare congenital heart condition. The loss changed the Blairs' lives forever. It also inspired them to find ways they could ensure Jillian's passion for the arts carried on.

Paying Jillian's Passion Forward

The idea for the scholarship came about as Amy and Michael came to grips with the hard fact that they would not have the opportunity to send Jillian to college, as they had done with their two older daughters. Deeply moved by Jillian's artistic vision— Amy calls it a Bohemian Chic sense of style—the couple wanted to ensure that her creative spirit would continue to inspire and support others.

"We wanted to be able to do something that gives back, and not just make it about Jillian, but make it something for students who are like her or people who are like her," Amy says. "It pretty quickly became our mission to help students who shared Jillian's unique and creative essence."

The scholarship is designed to assist students who are passionate about visual arts and might face challenges in their educational journey. Applicants are required to submit visual representations of their creativity, such as artwork or photographs, along with a written component where they can share their personal stories and aspirations.

When reviewing applications, Amy and Michael considered various aspects, including the applicant's artistic expression, their story, and the unique qualities that made them stand out. The scholarship recipients were chosen based on the essence of Jillian's spirit and how it resonated with the applicants.

A Meaningful Impact

Receiving the first batch of scholarship applications was a deeply emotional experience for the Blairs. Their backgrounds and perspectives as parents and educators made the process a rollercoaster of emotions, as they reviewed and reflected on the stories and aspirations of the applicants.

"We narrowed it down to a top five, and it was hard," Amy says. "After you've read people's stories and you'd think, 'I want them to get it' or 'I want that one to get it,' we had to separate ourselves and remember that Jillian was going to be our guide in making the decision."

Carrying Jillian's Memory Forward

For Amy and Michael, the amount of joy they have received in awarding the scholarship is proof that they chose a powerful way to honor Jillian's memory and preserve her unique spirit.

"The scholarship goes beyond the individual recipient," says Michael, who is a Graphic Design Instructor at DMACC. "It stands as a testament to the diverse and vibrant world of Design and Visual Art. We know that there is going to be somebody, for however long this scholarship goes on, that will be able to hear her name, know why they're getting the scholarship, read her story, and realize that because of her, they were able to have an easier road."

As an instructor, Michael emphasizes the importance of the College in the educational landscape.

"DMACC serves as a platform where unique stories like Jillian's and countless others can find support and encouragement," he says. "We are fortunate to have an option like DMACC available and accessible."

After making the first award this year, the Blairs say they are looking forward to the annual opportunity to make a difference in Jillian's memory.

"It is our heartfelt tribute to a young artist whose vision continues to inspire and touch the lives of students," Amy says. "It represents more than just financial support; it symbolizes the celebration of creativity, quirkiness, and the legacy of our daughter, whose unique artistic spirit lives on in the scholarship recipients who will follow in her footsteps. We are humbled for her memory to be carried on like this."

'Every Day Feels Like Craft Day'

If asked to choose between photography and graphic design, Taysia Bettis (pictured center, Page 8) would struggle to offer an answer. With a passion for both, she is pursuing studies in visual arts at DMACC with a big vision for her

That vision has room for employing her talents in both photography and graphic

"I'd say my dream job right now is working for a major magazine," Taysia says, mentioning that the Des Moines is renowned for the magazines published in the region. "Photography is definitely something I want to lean into in the future—studio photography and tabletop photography. I also want to explore the graphic design side."

She is developing her career vision with the assistance of the inaugural Jillian Blair Visual Arts Scholarship. The scholarship is named in memory of Jillian Blair, the daughter of Michael Blair, one of Taysia's professors. It celebrates Jillian's creative spirit and her passion for the visual arts. This scholarship not only recognizes Taysia's talent but also provides the financial support to help her reach her dreams.

To apply for the scholarship, Taysia submitted examples of her visual art, including photography and design work. She was overwhelmed after learning she had been chosen for the award.

"I was really excited," Taysia says. "It felt like a real honor. My work was being acknowledged, and especially since it was their first year doing it, I think it really was an honor."

In addition to the financial support, Taysia says she appreciate the collaborative environment at DMACC, particularly in the graphic design program.

"Professors encourage students to share ideas and engage in group discussions, enhancing the overall learning experience," she says. "Every day feels like a craft day, an exciting journey filled with creative challenges."




Inspiring Students to Dream Big

For a guy who made his living writing stories, the enduring legacy of Rob Borsellino is a story itself. Affable in a hardscrabble Bronx-born-and-raised kind

of way, Rob was passionate about his work, which took him from a childhood of poverty to the hallways of Bronx Community College and eventually to Central Iowa, where he and his wife, Rekha Basu, unwittingly found a home.

While his style—often black jeans and a leather jacket—showcased his authentic self, it stood out in the upper Midwest in the 1990s. But his unique look did little to slow his ascendency as he moved from the Des Moines Business Record to WOI-TV and eventually to the Des Moines Register. Rob quickly gained a following, using his gift for storytelling to inspire, inquire, celebrate, advocate, teach, connect and more.

He made readers laugh. And he made them think. And he left them wanting to talk about what he wrote.

Rob never shied away from asking the difficult questions or taking a stand. He was laser focused on the subjects that mattered. Whether drawing attention to the plight of the underserved or calling the powers-that-be out on the carpet, he approached his work with a dignity and presence that endured.

A Fitting Memorial

So, as news of his terminal illness became public in February 2005, his readers, his colleagues, his friends, and his community felt like they'd been delivered a collective gut punch. He battled ALS with the same dignity he approached his work. His fight inspired thousands, including musical legends Bob Dylan and Merle Haggard who traveled to Des Moines to perform a concert in his honor to raise funds for ALS research. When he passed in May 2006, his friends and his fans wanted to do something to cement his legacy.

Rekha says she was taken off guard by the response.

"When I was arranging Rob's funeral," Rekha says, "I really had no idea that there would be money coming in. The person who was helping us out encouraged us to give some thought to where we would like memorial donations to go. I wanted them to go to something that really would emulate Rob and sort of characterize who he was and help someone else who's been in the same positions that he had been as a child."

Rekha, who also was a columnist at the Des Moines Register, chose to direct memorial gifts to the DMACC Foundation to

establish the Rob Borsellino Journalism Scholarship. She says supporting those pursuing a career in writing has proven to be the perfect way to remember Rob.

> "He just had so much attitude in him," says Rekha, who is quick to admit that he gained a whole lot of 'Iowa nice' during his years in Des Moines. "His search was always to get the story behind the story of people who were struggling and people who lived on the fringes of society, because that's kind of how he grew up. And he went to Bronx Community College because that's all he could afford.

"I wanted to do something that was vibrant and that would reflect his life and inspire young people in the way that he had been inspired," she continues. "I knew that DMACC was the way to

Empowering Students

While neither Rob nor Rekha attended DMACC, they were very familiar with the College. Rekha says they loved attending the wildly popular DMACC dinners hosted by the Iowa Culinary Institute. Both Rob and Rekha had a relationship with DMACC President Rob Denson through their work. The couple had several friends who taught at the College and were guest speakers to several classes. Occasionally, they wrote about students or faculty or staff.

Awarded annually, this scholarship is designed to inspire young writers—not only those seeking a career in journalism but anyone with a passion for storytelling. The scholarship aims to support students who have experienced challenges, including financial difficulties, language barriers, or personal obstacles. It is intended to empower students to share their stories and experiences, illuminating the world's understanding of the struggles many individuals face in their journeys.

"This is about honoring the spirit of Rob," Rekha says. "We have been able to meet many of the scholarship winners and it is inspiring. Through Rob, we are able to give a hand up to those who have sort of lived on the margins in some way but are looking to put those experiences into writing to enlighten other people about what it's like. People who are doing everything, including in many cases going to college at night when they have a family to take care of, to get ahead and learn.

"I cannot adequately express how much it means to me," Rekha says, "the fact that his legacy, that his influence, that his inspiration is helping people to dream and to become what they dream of being."



As a first-generation college student and immigrant from Mexico, Andrea Montes Melendez knew if she was going to make in communications it would require a heavy dose of perseverance and ambition.

She also knew that she would need a helping hand to be able to make ends meet.

Currently pursuing a liberal arts degree at DMACC, Andrea has proven her mettle in the program and gotten the assistance she needed in earning the esteemed Rob Borsellino Journalism Scholarship.

Earning the scholarship named after the legendary *Des Moines Register* columnist, who had a profound impact on journalism in Iowa, is a source of inspiration for Andrea. It serves as a reminder that she too can make a significant mark in her chosen field.

"It just gives me the idea that I can become someone like that," Andrea says. "It's really inspiring."

Andrea's interest in writing and public relations stems from her lifelong love for reading and writing. She aspires to build and nurture relationships, ultimately aiming to work for a company where she can manage connections with celebrities and other



organizations. She says the support she has received at DMACC has allowed her to dream big.

"As a first-generation college student and immigrant, I have unique financial and other challenges going to college in the United States," Andrea says. "Any scholarship and any support that I can get, it's just a blessing for me."

After graduating from DMACC, Andrea plans to continue her education at Iowa State University, majoring in public relations and possibly minoring in event management.



In his decade as Photography Program Chair at DMACC, David Purdy has played a prominent role in the evolution of the program from one focused almost entirely on fine art to one with an array of options that provide numerous pathways to a wide assortment of careers.

As a hub for aspiring photographers seeking to turn their passion into a fulfilling career, the shift made sense.

"We wanted to take a pathway into commercial photography and portrait photography where students could make a living," says Purdy, who has vast experience as a news and commercial photographer and is a Pulitzer Prize winner. "It turned toward a trade angle because we are part of the industry technology part of DMACC."

In a world driven by visual content, the role of photography cannot be overstated.

David emphasizes that "images play a huge role in our everyday life," from product photography for advertisements to lifestyle photography for personal events. Whether it's high school senior portraits, engagement photos, or corporate branding, photography remains an integral part of our daily existence.

He adds that it is vital to have a program like the one at DMACC easily accessible to develop professionals with the knowledge and skills to be successful in a diverse field like photography. David notes that it is a bonus that DMACC has a

number of opportunities for students with financial challenges to receive aid.

"Scholarships are a huge financial help for students to invest in essential equipment or tools, such as cameras or laptops," David says. "This support not only eases the financial aspect of their education but also fosters their creative growth."

Witnessing that creative growth is a tremendous motivator for David.

"Watching them transition from photography enthusiasts to professionals who can make a living from their passion is immensely gratifying," David says. "In my students, I see myself. It reminds me of my own journey."

David can rattle off the names of dozens of students over his time in the program who have gone on to make meaningful contributions to the profession—from those who have gone on to work at large companies like Meredith, to others who have establishing thriving home-based portrait studios. He says this success is a result of the culture of support so common across DMACC's Campuses and Centers.

"There is a sense of community that prevails at the College," David says. "I am proud to work at a college that has such a strong commitment to ensuring that students don't get left behind, even in the face of personal challenges. This sense of belonging, coupled with dedicated instructors who know their students personally, sets DMACC apart from larger universities."







Photography Program is Picture Perfect

DJ aspires to work in photojournalism, capturing stories that shape the world.



Annual 5K Draws Record Numbers to Run/Walk in Support of Scholarships

The DMACC Alumni Association and Foundation held a very successful sixth annual 5K walk/run on September 30, breaking several new records with:

- The warmest 5K event to date—nearly 70 degrees at start!
- The greatest turnout of volunteer support (Thank you, volunteers!)
- The highest number of registrants at 306 exceeding our goal of 300.
- A \$3,250 increase in cash sponsorships over 2022 for a total of \$16,000 plus an ADDITIONAL \$5,000 in in-kind support!
- \$14,000 raised for DMACC student scholarships, bringing our total to more than \$50,000 since our launch in 2018.


